American Power and the Legacy of the Greatest Generation Class 1001 (Zoom)

Mondays, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/22- 2/26)

World War 2 transformed the United States from an isolationist, inward-looking nation with minimal influence on the global stage to an economic powerhouse and world leader. After 1945, the U.S. was manufacturing more than half of the produced goods in the world, and U.S. exports made up more than one-third of total global exports. With this rapid rise in power and influence, the U.S. took on new responsibilities, signaling the beginning of the "American Era" of global leadership. The good, the bad, and the ugly of American power since 1900 will be reviewed and discussed. We will take a hard look at diplomacy, use of the military, covert power, and humanitarian interventions to grade each event as necessary, successful, and contributing to the greater good.



Michael Baker, M.D., is a retired general, vascular, and trauma surgeon, Commonwealth Club/World Affairs Board of Trustees member, and Osher LifeLong Learning (OLLI) faculty member at UC Berkeley, Dominican University, California State University East Bay and Channel Islands. He also served 30 years in the uniform of his country, retiring from the U.S. Navy with the rank of Rear Admiral. He has published over 80 peer reviewed articles on a wide range of subjects from wounds and trauma to medical intelligence and building the hospital ship of the future. He has had three tours teaching casualty care techniques in Ukraine during the Russian invasion and frequently speaks and writes about this conflict and defending democracy.

Precursors to the 1960s: Rebels & Innovators of the 1950s

Class 1002 (COLV/Zoom & In-Person)

Mondays, 1:00 PM – 3:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/22-2/26)

The 1960s gave rise to a profound shift in American culture and politics. Most of today's defining social issues, ranging from reconceptions of race, gender, ethnicity, identity, and more, can be traced to movements of the 1960s. Yet, the transformative changes of the 1960s did not spring fully-formed in the short decade of the sixties. Notably, cultural innovations in art, literature, music, and film during the 1950s decisively shaped events in the 1960s. This course will explore these key areas of innovation, including the folk music revolution, jazz, the Beats, stand-up comedy, and film. We will examine key figures in each of these movements and we'll seek to trace the pattern of influence from 1950s innovators into the 1960s cultural and social explosion.



Clifford Wilcox, Ph.D., holds a Doctorate in American intellectual history from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He is Director of Education and Operations at Temple Beth Torah in Ventura, CA. He is also an adjunct professor in the CSUCI OLLI program and the California Lutheran University Fifty and Better program. He focuses on American cultural and intellectual history and Jewish Studies.

Tuesday

Paris of the Impressionists: The Sites and Locales of the Masterworks of Impressionism

Class 1003 (Zoom)

Tuesdays, 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/23 – 2/27)

The art of the Impressionists explored the contemporary world in which they lived and worked. Featuring the cafes and nightclubs of Montmartre—as well as racetracks, train stations, boulevards, parks, operas and ballet—the Impressionists documented everyday life in the modern city of Paris. Taking advantage of the newly invented paint tubes, they were able to paint outside while looking directly at subjects rather than working in a studio from sketches. The advent of photography influenced them to focus on light, color, cropping, movement, and spontaneity. In this course, we armchair travel around Paris, exploring their paintings of Paris and the sites that inspired them.



Katherine E. Zoraster is a contextual Art Historian and a Professor of Art History specializing in Western art from the Renaissance to the 20th century. In addition to OLLI, she teaches at a variety of other schools and programs, including as the instructor for the full-time program at the Los Angeles Academy of Figurative Arts. Katherine is also a member of the Art Muse team, giving private museum tours and teaching classes and serves as a commissioner for the Burbank Cultural Arts Commission.

Car Nation: The Automobile in American History

Class 1004 (COLV/Zoom & In-Person)

Tuesdays, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/23 - 2/27)

This course will explore the history of one of the single most important objects in American life: the automobile. From their invention in the late 19th century, we'll witness how cars evolved to become the center of a new industrial economy, transforming the country with the creation of endless roads and highways, and lodging themselves in the cultural imagination as symbols of American freedom. Along the way, we'll reflect on the wider history and politics of transportation in America, as we discover the powerful role that cars have played in shaping conversations about race, class, labor, technology, climate change, and more.



David Parsons, Ph.D., received his Doctorate in History from the Graduate Center of the City University of New York (CUNY). He is a professor and writer whose work focuses on the political, social, and cultural history of 20th century America. He has taught courses in U.S. history at CUNY and New York University, and he hosts a long-running weekly podcast on history and politics called Nostalgia Trap. His book, "Dangerous Grounds: Antiwar Coffeehouses and Military Dissent in the Vietnam Era," explores links between the civilian peace movement and the American military.

Exploring Ancient Greek Vases

Class 1005 (CSUCI/Zoom & In-Person)

Wednesdays, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/24 - 2/28)

Dive into the captivating world of Ancient Greek vases in this immersive course that unlocks the secrets of these timeless artifacts. These vases are more than just vessels; they are windows into the rich tapestry of Greek culture and history. We will explore the origins of Greek pottery and trace its evolution from the Geometric period to the Classical era. Throughout the course, we will learn about the unparalleled craftsmanship and artistry of Greek potters and painters, from various firing techniques to the intricate stories and symbols depicted on these vessels. At the end of the course, we will visit the Getty Villa Museum to examine first hand a wide variety of Ancient Greek vases and put our knowledge to work.



Scott Jones is a docent at the J. Paul Getty Museum (Getty Villa) where he leads interactive tours in Roman architecture, Roman gardens and plants, and museum objects in the galleries. Additionally, he assists museum curators conduct online art explorations where art objects from the collections are explored with a worldwide audience in a Zoom environment. He is a retired US Navy Captain with more than 30 years' service. He is an instructor in the OLLI program at Cal State Channel Islands as well as the Fab 50 program at California Lutheran University.

American Civics 101: A Crash Course

Class 1006 (Zoom)

Wednesdays, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/24 - 2/28)

American Civics 101 is a timely discussion using "real-time" events and issues to explain what every person applying for U.S. citizenship needs to know...how our U.S. government actually works! Many Americans tend to take their Citizenship for granted. Just imagine if the rules changed and you now had to take a government civics test every year to remain a U.S. citizen... would you be able to pass? Could you identify the co-equal branches of Government? Understand the ramifications of recent Supreme Court decisions on voting, gun control, affirmative action and others? Explain the importance of the U.S. Constitution and its 27 amendments, including its Bill of Rights? American Civics 101 will explore all these topics and more.



Alan Perper is a founding member of VoteAslf.org, an LA based consortium of professionals seeking to increase voter registration and turnout. He has previously trained with the USCIS and has taught numerous civics and citizenship classes at both OLLI university programs and community adult learning centers. Perper also received his secondary education teaching credential through CA State University, Northridge and has taught high school Economics, AP Government and Business classes at two LAUSD campuses.

How Will Our Species Survive?

Class 1007 (SCIART/Zoom & In-Person)

Thursdays, 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM, 6-weeks (2/1 – 3/7, course begins one week later)

There are many critical issues that are currently impacting the future of our species. Some of them are: Abundant Water, Food Security, Energy Resources, Health & Disease, Geo-climate, and Artificial Intelligence. You probably already have some ideas about each of these. In this course we will look at the scientific underpinnings of these six issues and explore the potential future. For each issue, Jerry Clifford will introduce the topic and describe some of the science. Then he will have a conversation with a CSUCI faculty member (including some of our favorite OLLI instructors) who has specific expertise in the area. Hopefully, the dialog will encourage questions and comments from the class.



Jerry Clifford, Ph.D., spent decades (we won't count) as a scientist and educator after receiving a PhD in Nuclear Physics at Iowa State University. As an Air Force officer, he taught physics at the Air Force Academy, worked on nuclear weapons programs, studied particle beams for Reagan's Star Wars, and worked in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. Jerry has taught physics and astronomy at Seton Hall U., Fairleigh Dickinson U., and CSUCI. He has taught adult learners in OLLI since the program started in 2004.

The Baltic Countries: Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia Class 1008 (Zoom)

Thursdays, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM, 6-weeks (1/25 - 2/29)

The three Baltic countries—Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia—are a beautiful and captivating, if often overlooked, part of Europe. While today they are often mentioned in the same breath, they are historically, culturally, ethnically, and linguistically very different from one another. The Baltic countries' more recent history, however, has united them in the struggle against Soviet domination, and their struggle was instrumental in bringing down the Soviet Union. In the 30 years since the dissolution of the USSR, the Baltic countries have experienced economic growth and cultural revival, attracting more tourists than ever. Join us for a fascinating, virtual trip to the three Baltic countries!



Asya Pereltsvaig, Ph.D., received a degree in English and History from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and a PhD in Linguistics from McGill University. She taught at Yale and Stanford, and has been teaching in lifelong education programs since 2010. Her expertise is in language and history, and the relationship between them. Her most recent book, Languages of the World: An Introduction, 3rd edition (2020) was published by Cambridge University Press. Asya is a popular instructor for OLLI programs around the country and was the faculty host for the OLLI trip to the Baltic countries and St. Petersburg in July 2017.

Brain Training

Class 1009 (SCIART/Zoom & In-Person)

Fridays, 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM, 6-weeks **(2/2-3/8, course begins one week later)**

Scientific evidence supports the idea that activities focused on mental stimulation can help keep our brains healthy as we age. Systematic cognitive training has been shown to produce positive and long lasting (5-10 years) effects on our ability to think, on daily functioning, and even on driving skills. This workshop will introduce the latest studies in this emerging field, and it will offer students the opportunity to engage in cognitive training activities focused on memory, reasoning, and speed of processing. It's time to train your brain!



BiJian Fan, Ph.D., received his B.S. and M.S. in Mathematics, and his Ph.D. in Mechanical Engineering at Texas A&M University. He spent most of his professional career in pharmaceutical research and development at Merck and Amgen. He has moved on to visual art, and has exhibited internationally and earned numerous recognitions. BiJian integrates art and science in his creative practice and exhibits and lectures scientific art internationally.
