Environmental (In) Justice in the South and Central Coast

Class 1001 (CSUCI/Zoom & In-Person)

Monday, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6 Weeks, (10/20-11/24)

This course explores the rise of an environmental justice movement and realities of environmental injustice through the lens of California's Central Coast. Many understand social movements, like women's and civil rights. Many believe in environmentalism. But what is the combination of the two and why is it important we account for social and environmental issues at the same time? The region is shaped by agriculture, development, indigenous stewardship, state and federal politics, natural disasters, and resilience. In that confluence, burdens and benefits are distributed across communities unequally. The result can be people who thrive and those that are forced to suffer loss of health, access, or culture. Our unique histories and lived experiences are those of Indigenous peoples, farmworkers, retirees, ultra wealthy, working class, and frontline populations--all deserve the opportunity to thrive in an equitable and just place. We will learn how to create that opportunity.



Sean Ferguson, Ph.D., began his educational journey as a biologist at the Univ. of Chicago before graduate studies in the interdisciplinary field of Science and Technology Studies at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He has published on a diversity of topics from state energy politics to green technology innovation to critical pedagogy. At the Univ. of Virginia, he spent 7 years teaching and conducting research in the Engineering and Society Department, working with nonprofit organizations, engineering faculty, and local government offices to find pathways to sustainability. He is now the Operations Director at a grant writing firm specializing in empowering organizations to build thriving communities. He also serves as Treasurer of a new environmental justice nonprofit in Santa Barbara and has supported grants of over \$20M of funding for environmental justice and the green economy along our regional Coast.

Last Human Standing: The Evolution and Peopling of the World by Homo sapiens.

Class 1002 (CSUCI/Zoom & In-Person)

Monday, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM, 6 Weeks, (10/20-11-24)

This course is the fourth installment of "The Lost World of Hominins" course series surveying the evolution of hominins over the last c. 6 million years. This time we explore the earliest fossil, genetic, archaeological, and environmental evidence for us, Homo sapiens, and our initial peopling of the Earth during the late Pleistocene (c. 300,000 years ago to c. 11,000 years before present). Where did we originate? How do we relate to other human species, like Neandertals? What behavioral, technological, and environmental factors allowed us to spread across six continents during and between the last of the Ice Ages, settling in landscapes never inhabited by other hominin species? Why after 6 million years of hominin evolution are we the only hominin and human species left on Earth? These are some of the questions this course explores as we trace our human journey.



Matthew (Matt) Curtis, Ph.D., is a broadly trained anthropological archaeologist specializing in the Holocene archaeology of Eastern Africa. Matt has conducted archaeological research in Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, and the United States, is a former National Science Foundation grantee, and is the founder and director of Eastern African Archaeology Online. He is a lecturer in the Anthropology program and faculty archaeologist for the Cultural Resource Management Team at CSUCI.

Tuesday

Understanding the Deep Structures of Culture: Tools for Preparing for Your Next International Vacation

Class 1003 (CSUCI/Zoom & In-Person)

Tuesday, 1:00 - 3:00 PM, 6 Weeks (10/21-12/2, *No class 11/11)

Preparing for an international journey does not just begin and end with all the reservation details of departures, arrivals, connections, and tours! Getting the most out of your travel budget means doing a little homework about your final destinations, long before you start to pack your suitcase! This course will equip you with a simple theoretical framework for understanding more about the countries/cultures you want to visit. This course will outline the three Deep Structures of Culture which offer important clues to exploring your intended destinations. This course is not a travel guide, nor does it give suggestions about "where to go and what to see" for itinerary planning. Rather, it seeks to lay out a practical strategy for how to research a place you might like to visit, before leaving home! Non-travelers are welcome, too! Come join me to learn about the exciting role Culture plays in everyday life!



Vivian Henchy, M.A., RYT-200, has taught at CSU Channel Islands in the Communication Department since 2009. She has over twenty years of Higher Education teaching experience and has also worked for over fifteen years in corporate positions within health care and high-tech companies. Vivian is a past recipient of the CSUCI Faculty Award for Outstanding Community Engagement. She completed her M.A. in Intercultural Communication at San Diego State University, graduating with Phi Kappa Phi Honors, and her B.A. in Communication from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo. Vivian earned her RYT-200 (Registered Yoga Teacher) Certification and has been teaching yoga since 2021.

Wednesday

Siberia: Russia's Frozen Wasteland or Its Economic Heartland? Class 1004 (Zoom)

Wednesday, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6 Weeks, (10/22-12/3, *No class 11/26)

Siberia constitutes three quarters of Russia's territory, but only a quarter of the country's population lives there. Yet, the role of Siberia in making Russia a large and wealthy empire should not be underestimated. In this new course, we will talk about Siberia's role in the rise and possibly imminent dismantling of Russia as a unified state; Siberia's economic importance, both historically and today; the region's indigenous peoples and their cultures; its role as a penal colony throughout history and how that function transformed the region; its importance for climate change and environmental issues; and the relations between Russia and China, in which Siberia plays a crucial role.



Asya Pereltsvaig, Ph.D., received a degree in English and History from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and a PhD in Linguistics from McGill University. She taught at Yale and Stanford, and has been teaching in lifelong education programs since 2010. Her expertise is in language and history, and the relationship between them. Her most recent book, Languages of the World: An Introduction, 4th edition (2023) was published by Cambridge University Press. Asya is a popular instructor for OLLI programs around the country and was the faculty host for another Osher Institute's trip to the Baltic countries and St. Petersburg in July 2017.

Health and Longevity Optimization in the Modern Age Class 1005 (CSUCI/Zoom & In-Person)

Wednesday, 1:00 - 3:00 PM, 6 Weeks, (10/22-12/3, *No class 11/26)

With the recent advances of scientific and medical knowledge, we are finally empowered with exciting and innovative information that can help us understand how to extend our life span and health span. Using our new biometric technology (smart watches, glucose monitors and digital nutrition apps), you and your functional medicine physician can dive deep in the challenging interplay of the critical factors that help define our success in extending our life span and health span. The major factors that come to play in the balance and harmony of health are: Nutrition, Exercise, Sleep and Stress Reduction. This course will tackle that deep dive with how to understand and manage the interplay of those factors, using detailed and specific actionable explanations and skills.



Stanley Frochtzwajg, M.D. is a Family Physician and has practiced primary care for 45 years in Ventura County. Dr. Frochtzwajg is now focusing on and integrating functional, integrative medical care with traditional western medicine. Dr. Frochtzwajg received his undergraduate training at UCLA with a degree in Microbiology, his Medical School training at UC Irvine Medical School, and his Residency training in Family Medicine at Ventura County Medical Center. He has trained Medical Students, Family Medicine residents, Physician assistants, and Nurse practitioners for 25 years at residency training programs, private practice and clinics. He has delivered numerous public presentations on health and healthcare topics.

Thursday

The Reconstruction Era (1865-1877)

Class 1006 (SCIART/Zoom & In-Person)

Thursday, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6 Weeks (10/23-12/4, *No class 11/27)

This class will examine the major events and players in the period of United States history (1865-1877) that followed the American Civil War and was dominated by the legal, social, and political challenges of the abolition of slavery and the reintegration of the eleven former Confederate States back into the Union. It was a tumultuous era, the reverberations of which are still felt today.



Bill Garlington, Ph.D., has a Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts in History from UCLA and a Doctorate in Asian Studies and Sociology from the Australian National University. He has taught at all academic levels on three continents and carried out sociological anthropological fieldwork in India. His main academic interests are the sociology of religion and the history of ideas.

The Baroque: St. Peter's to St. Paul's Part 1

Class 1007 (Zoom)

Thursday, 1:00 - 3:00 PM, 6 Weeks (10/30-12/11, *No class 11/27. Class begins one week later.)

Known as the Baroque, the art of the 17th century emerged in Italy out of the Catholic Counter-Reformation but spread throughout Europe and England. Dynamic and dramatic, it varied and adapted with its geographic region and patronage. This course begins with the art cultivated by the Catholic Church in response to the Protestant Reformation. Headed by the sculpture and architecture of Bernini and the paintings of Caravaggio, they set the standards for revolution in style following the Renaissance. Fostered by absolute rulers, we see how this highly ornate style develops in Spain, France, and Flanders with the likes of Diego Velazquez, Hyacinthe Rigaud, and Peter Paul Rubens; and how it presents itself differently with the open market of the Netherlands. We end our Baroque journey in England with the architectural dominance of Sir Christopher Wren. Part 1 will focus on the origins of the Baroque and cover the iterations in Italy and Spain, with an introduction to the French Baroque.



Katherine E. Zoraster is a contextual Art Historian and a Professor of Art History specializing in Western art from the Renaissance to the 20th century. In addition to OLLI, she teaches at a variety of other schools and programs, including as the instructor for the full-time program at the Los Angeles Academy of Figurative Arts. Katherine is also a member of the Art Muse team, giving private museum tours and teaching classes and serves as a commissioner for the Burbank Cultural Arts Commission.

What the Heck Happened to My Country?

Class 1008 (Zoom)

Friday, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6 Weeks (10/24-12/5, *No class 11/28)

The last hundred years was the "American Century." The USA won two World Wars, came to dominate the global economy, powered tremendous innovation in science and set global norms. Yet America is now seemingly at war with itself: leadership has been eroded, institutions have been denigrated, there is a huge partisan divide, facts and truth do not matter to many, and we seem to have lost our image and leadership role. These lectures will examine those elements of a state's effectiveness that made America great and led to the American Century. We will also discuss some of the challenges currently facing the nation and identify key areas for renewal so that America can once again unite as a strong democracy, regain a prominent role in world leadership, and be a model for success



Michael Baker, M.D., recently retired from a 40-year career in general, vascular, and trauma surgery. He also served 30 years in the uniform of his country and retired with the rank of Rear Admiral. He currently teaches history, political science, and military affairs for the Osher LifeLong Learning (OLLI) Programs at UC Berkeley, Dominican, CSUEB, CSUCI—and is on the Board of Governors of the Commonwealth Club. He teaches Advanced Trauma Life Support (ATLS) at military bases around the world and most recently returned from his 5th tour in Ukraine teaching ATLS to physicians in that war-torn nation.

Between the Wars: America 1917—1941 through the Lens of Short Fiction

Class 1009 (GACC, In-Person Only)

Friday, 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM, 6 Weeks (10/24-12/5, *No class 11/28)

The period between the world wars witnessed dramatic changes in the social fabric of the United States. In this literary discussion class, we will read short stories from this period of transition (all available on the Library of America website or as pdfs from instructor) and explore the ways they reflect and the culture of the times and depict the ways society was changing forever. Stories will encompass a wide array of styles and genres, from literary works of Fitzgerald and Anderson to the humor of Thurber and Lardner, and will include work from the Harlem Renaissance, Southern voices, and even dip into noir, science fiction and horror. Participants should read the assigned stories before each class session. Active participation in the discussion is encouraged in a friendly, stimulating setting.



Robert Weibezahl is a writer, editor, critic, and publishing industry veteran who has worked with Nobel laureates, Pulitzer Prize winners, and countless bestselling authors. He was a columnist for BookPage for two decades and is also a published novelist and short story writer, as well as an award-winning, internationally-produced playwright. He teaches at Osher programs across the country.

What is Osher Online?

Osher Online is a program of classes run by the Osher National Resource Center (NRC) in partnership with participating OLLI programs, like CSUCI. These classes are in addition to the OLLI classes provided by CSUCI and complement our in-house offerings. Osher Online provides a wide range of new instructors and an opportunity to connect with members from other OLLIs nationwide. Osher Online courses are managed by Osher NRC staff.

Where can I view the course descriptions?

Course descriptions will be available on our online Registration Page.

How do I register?

Please register for each Osher Online course on our online Registration Page as you would for any OLLI course. Please note that there is an enrollment limit for Osher Online courses.

How much does it cost?

Osher Online courses are \$72 per course. OLLI at CSUCI's \$20 annual membership fee is required to participate. Osher Online courses are not included in our Unlimited Enrollment Plans.

How do I receive my Zoom link and course materials?

Osher NRC staff manage all aspects of course delivery. Osher Online staff will contact you via email to provide log-in credentials for access to class Zoom links, syllabi, discussion boards, and download supplemental materials. Additionally, Osher NRC staff will invite you to attend an orientation before classes begin, where they will go over access to courses and class materials.

Levels of Enrollment

- Basic Enrollment: Pay \$36 for each 3-week course or \$72 for each 6-week course in which you wish to enroll.
- Session Enrollment: Take unlimited courses this session for \$180 for individuals or \$270 for couples
 - **Osher Online courses are not included in the Unlimited Enrollment plans.
 Students must register for these courses individually.

Non-Refundable Annual Membership Fee

The Osher Lifelong Learning Foundation requires participants to become members of their local affiliate. For OLLI at CSUCI, this fee is \$20 and is paid once per Academic Year. The OLLI Annual Membership Fee is due upon enrollment in the student's first session of the school year and remains active from Fall 2025 through Summer 2026.

Members with unlimited enrollment may be eligible for a full refund if a formal drop request is submitted in Week 1 of the session. For Osher Online courses, a formal drop request must be submitted before the second class session. After that time, no refund will be issued for a dropped class.
